I visited the Mills on Sunday, on
20th or 21st of June 1857.

Having arrived in the Village and being
on my way to the Mill, I met a plain
Frenchman who was on his way to French
Milling. I asked him if he
could tell me where the Windmill was
if I was on the right way to the Windmill.

He replied that this was his
own Mill; that he was on his way
to French Milling, and that I
was on the way to it, and only to
follow it, and it would bring me
to it.

~~Even my long ride to his house.~~

In due time he arrived at and
found me in his house, and took me
all over it, and showed me the

premises. He had been the Tenant of the Wind Mill

a long time, more than twenty years.

This Ghost had haunted a particular and large sized room, at night, such
that it was generally to sleep in it most of the time, and this Miller
therefore abandoned it to the Ghost. The Ghost was a woman.

She very often exhibited herself during the day, by standing
on the sill of a window that was on a public street.

On these occasions, one half of her person projected to feet was

inside the house, and the other side was outside the house.

The face was to the street, and she stood there during

a considerable time, while the street was often filled

with spectators.

had on leave when I went there to see it, also

When a Ghost is seen - a Woman -

She frequently stood in one of the Windows
of this Miller's ^{Mill} House (that is a part
of the Windmill, and with abundance of
nice Rooms as is common in Europe)
and in the first story thereof.

One half of this Ghost stood ^{often} ~~outside~~
in a glazed Window of the first ^{floor} of the House
of the ~~London~~ ^{London}; the other half inside,
~~of the London~~ ^{end};

She stood upon the sill of the Window
and the Window being closed,
one half of her person being within the house
and the other half on the outside
thereof,

The Window sashes being closed
~~the~~ ~~the~~ and the Window ^{standing}
erect, one half of her person was
within the house and the other, outside
thereof, while hundreds of people
stood in the street, looking at her.
